## From the Executive Director

The NEBC Board of Directors, at its annual all-day planning session in May, explored the organization’s role within the “ecosystem” of our portion of the business community and the many associations that our members belong to. What has always made NEBC distinct from most other associations is its breadth. Every professional and business sector (and sub-sector) has its narrowly focused associations, whether highly technical or marketing oriented, that dig deep – providing technical training, journals, certification, etc. Most NEBC members belong to one or more of these niche organizations as individuals or through their companies, but they also belong to NEBC.

As a **cross sector** (air, water, soil, energy, waste, construction, etc.) and **cross discipline** (engineering, consulting, legal, project development, etc.) organization, NEBC brings together a wider range of people than the niche organizations. This leads to cross fertilization of ideas, expands knowledge, and opens up rich

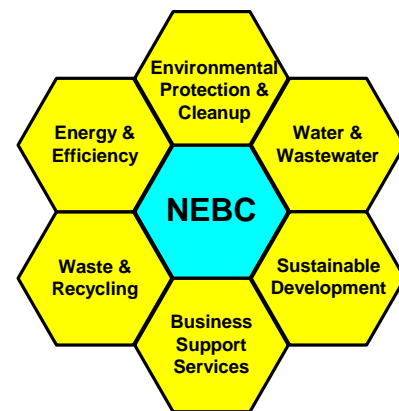
networking and business development opportunities. In addition, our **cross state** operations gives us a valuable perspective when working with our state economic development partners.

I used to have a visual image of NEBC as an “umbrella” – opening wider as we incorporate emerging sectors such as renewable energy, sustainable development, and climate change management. One outcome of the Board discussion

for me is a new visual image of NEBC as a hub, a nexus, linking and integrating our various member sectors. This is particularly appropriate given how the boundaries between disciplines continue to blur. Just look at how much environmental permitting work is being done in support of energy projects, and how many environmental consultants and lawyers are becoming certified as LEED professionals.

Being a nexus means taking seriously our role as connection-maker and integrator. For example, look at the content of some of our conferences: “stormwater management” including not only prevention of industrial pollution but low impact residential development as well; “renewable energy” consciously drawing the connection from traditional energy resources to new ones; “ecosystem markets” bringing together an unlikely alliance of habitat restoration, business, and economics; and “brownfields redevelopment” aligning the science of contamination cleanup with economic development and sustainable communities.

While working to serve our historical base of members and issues, we are always reaching out to the new. Part of NEBC’s role as a nexus is to initiate new conversations, explore new ideas, and build new partnerships. Despite our own attempts at categorization – see the Resource Guide as an example – NEBC’s world cannot be described as a set of boxes. Instead our member sectors reflect overlapping circles and shifting boundaries connected by a web of relationships – just like the world we work in.



And did I mention business development? The wider the set of people you interact with, the more opportunities arise. Creating opportunities: that’s what we’re here for.

**Federal Stimulus Money Awarded to Oregon and Washington for Underground Storage Tank**

**Cleanups.** The federal Environmental Protection Agency ("EPA") has announced how it will divide up among the states the \$200 million in the stimulus bill allocated for cleaning up leaking underground storage tank sites around the county. EPA is awarding nearly \$2.7 million to Oregon and \$3.4 million to Washington. Part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 contains an appropriation for the EPA's Leaking Underground Storage Tank Trust Fund. The money will be used to pay for the agency's oversight of assessment and cleanup of underground tank leaks or directly pay for assessing and cleaning up leaks from federally regulated tanks where the responsible party is unknown or is unwilling or unable to pay for cleanup, or if there is an emergency situation requiring immediate cleanup. **Portland Harbor Superfund, Environmental Tort**

**Claim** Policyholders that are or may become involved in the Portland Harbor Superfund action may be well positioned to successfully recover from their legacy insurers. Oregon law has been generally favorable to policyholders involved in environmental claims. Specifically, the Oregon Environmental Cleanup Assistance Act, originally enacted in 1999 and then amended in 2003 ("Chapter 465"), is considered to be pro-policyholder legislation. It clarifies responsibilities of insurers with respect to environmental claims and compels them to assist in locating historic policies.<sup>1</sup> But just what are these old policies worth, and how can they offset environmental claim costs? Determining this answer is much more difficult than simply pulling old policies from a filing cabinet, adding up the limits of the policies at issue, and submitting a claim. While not exhaustive, what follows is an overview of 13 key issues that affect the value of historical insurance assets available to offset Portland Harbor Superfund site costs, as well as other legacy tort costs.
